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Mayor's Report

Dear Residents,

The Village of Los Ranchos is a special place. We all know this and live here because of it. Keeping the Village special is my sincere goal as your Mayor. But it is a challenge. With 18 months left in this term, I commit to addressing this and other challenges



with care, and with your concerns in mind.

One of the most challenging issues we face is how to keep the Village open, green, and semi-rural, while continuing to encourage new residents-especially young families making this their home, and seniors wanting to downsize and age in place. These seemingly contradictory goals can only be achieved if we work together.

We developed the 2035 Los Ranchos Master Plan in 2019 with tremendous input and suggestions from local residents on ways to tackle those goals. One idea was to designate key areas to allow more dense housing, such as Village Center. Another idea was to consider areas where homes can be grouped closer together to preserve open space. We are currently in the midst of trying to put all these ideas into concrete action.

We are working every day to resolve issues residents bring to our attention. Below are some recent accomplishments:

- ▶ Residents indicated having difficulties walking along Guadalupe Trail because vehicles were using this residential roadway as a cut-through. Earlier this year, we installed eight speed humps to increase safety.
- ▶ The parking on Rio Grande Boulevard created an unsafe situation for pedestrians and bicyclists during the Growers' Market. To alleviate this, we installed Parallell Parking Only signs, and are seeing significant improvements.
- ▶ The newly-created all-volunteer Business and Economic Development Committee recommended adding a community calendar to our website, to inform

residents, businesses, and visitors of events and activities taking place in the Village. The calendar went "live" in June. Check it out. And be on the lookout for more from this committee in the future.

- ▶ In order to address traffic issues on Chavez Road. especially those related to speeding and the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists, we're taking an all-of-the above kind of approach. So far, we have narrowed the lanes through restriping, purchased and placed new speed boards, and applied for and received over \$400,000 to study the right-of-way and design for a multi-use trail along the roadway.
- ▶ Neighbors who use the trail in Hartnett Park asked for some seating on the southern end of the park. We're excited to announce there are now two new benches in the shade of the Ash trees.
- ▶ Finally, our Village Center project, a dream of Late Mayor Abraham, a major goal in the 2010 Los Ranchos Master Plan (developed in 2000), and an amazing opportunity for Los Ranchos, is underway. We have started by demolishing the A-AAA Storage facility and will soon be clearing the entire site. For a brief history of the project, images, and elevations, see page 8 or visit our website.

There are pressures on all of us, with a lingering pandemic, and persistent inflation that's putting strains on every American family. These and other stressors can elicit hopelessness, fear and distrust—especially of your government. Please know that I understand. Disagreement and even discord are part of a healthy democracy. As your elected Mayor, I am listening. The issues before us are difficult. By continuing to voice your concerns, showing up to meetings, and visiting me one-on-one, we will find our way through the difficulties together, as a Village.

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BACK TO SCHOOL ISSUE 2022

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
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Village Center Project

The Village Center Project, encompassing just over twelve acres on the southeast side of 4th Street and Osuna, is in development after 22 years of planning. The timeline on the right shows a brief chronology describing the intensity of planning that has brought Village Center to the current point of development.

The Project came about initially to address some key challenges identified in the 2010 Los Ranchos Master Plan (developed and adopted in 2000) and that still exist today, namely an aging population, high property values, and limited housing options for young families to move in and seniors to downsize and remain in Los Ranchos.

A mixed-use development at 4th and Osuna—one of the most urbanized, heavily trafficked areas in the Village—was seen as the perfect place to build on that urban energy with some moderate densification and more affordable housing options for young adults, families, and seniors.

The renderings show the housing portion of the project, three apartment buildings capped at three (3) stories, surrounding central plazas that are accessible to the public. The apartments will be built along the north side of the property along Osuna Boulevard. Features include waterwise landscaping and silo-style architecture that honors our agricultural heritage.

Future phases of the project will include micro-retail, a community farm, fed by the existing acequia, an amphitheater, a community and economic development center, and a boutique hotel.





2002 Under Mayor John Hooker, the Village of Los Ranchos created the Village Center Zone and adopted it into law in 2003. This Zone was designated to allow for a more unique development pattern that included increased density, new housing options, economic vibrancy, and diversity.

2007 The Village, under Mayor Larry P. Abraham, outlined the VC Zone project and declared the area a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area (MRA). It began acquiring property in the designated zone and continued to do so for the next 10 years.

2018 On March 14, 2018, the Village adopted Resolution No. 2018-3-2, the MRA Plan, which allowed for a public private partnership to develop the project. The New Mexico Metropolitan Redevelopment Code grants powers to the Village to promote developments within blighted areas and authorizes the Village to rehabilitate and redevelop the area for public health, safety, and welfare.

On April 16, 2018, after adoption of the Plan, the Village issued a Request For Proposals (RFP) to identify and select an experienced developer with the required finances to acquire, consolidate, design, develop, operate, and own the Village Center Metropolitan Redevelopment Area.

Palindrome Communities, LLC submitted the successful proposal, in part because of their unique approach to maintaining the look and feel of Los Ranchos, as well as their addition of an economic/small business development focus. The highlights were the use of an acequia in the design, a community garden, and a center for business development, among other features, such as housing, retail, and micro-retail.

2019 In 2019, in fulfillment of a requirement of the RFP, Palindrome worked with Applied Economics to provide an estimate of the economic returns from the project. The study showed a total annual economic impact of \$15.7 million on the county's economy each year, or \$145.7 million over the first ten years of operations. Approximately 90 percent of these impacts would be captured in the Village of Los Ranchos.

2020 In October of 2020, under Mayor Donald T. Lopez, the Village approved a Development Agreement with Palindrome to build a mixed-use, residential and commercial development on the designated Metropolitan Redevelopment Plan area.

2022 In June of 2022, with financing secured and plans in place, Palindrome began the process of demolition of the existing buildings, beginning with the old storage facility.

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Tomato Pie

Ingredients

9" pie crust

1/2 cup chopped onions

3-4 large, ripe tomatoes

1/2 cup mayonnaise

2 cups grated cheese

Garlic (optional)

Basil

Hot Sauce

Butter for sautéing

Pre-bake a 9" pie crust according to the package directions, and cool well. While this is going on, chop up about ½ cup of onions (or shallots or leeks), and sauté in butter until soft and starting to caramelize (and you may add just a bit of garlic). Cut in half three to four large, ripe tomatoes and squeeze them to remove the seeds and some juice. Chop them into bite-sized pieces, and put them in a colander over a bowl, sprinkle with salt, and let them drain. Don't want any juice! Slice some basil, and I like a bit of oregano, too. Mix about 1/2 cup of mayonnaise with 2 cups of grated cheese: Add some hot sauce. Spread the onions in the pie crust, add the tomatoes, well squeezed and drained, then the basil, and then the cheese mixture in layers. Pop the pie into a 350° oven and bake it for 25 to 45 minutes, until well browned.

Sweet Nothings is a home-based family bakery business owned by Jan Siegrist and daughter, Johanna. Jan grew up with two great cooks, her Mom and Grandmother, and Johanna holds a baking certificate from the Culinary Arts program at CNM.

The duo started baking gluten free 21 years ago when Jan was diagnosed with Celiac disease. Suggestions from others working on gluten free recipes, years of practice, and experimenting with various ingredients have led to the products that they make today.

When they started, little more than rice crackers was available for those unable to consume gluten (wheat, rye, barley, and most oats). Today, there are many commercial products available in the stores. Some are good, but many still leave a lot to be desired. Their policy is to offer for sale only those products for which they would pay good money themselves, and that taste delicious to everyone.

Sweet Nothings has many regular customers who do not need to eat gluten free. At each market, they offer bread, brownies, fruit bars, cookies, muffins, fresh-on-order Belgian waffles, and more. They also accept special orders for many items, including pies and quiches.

Jan and Johanna enjoy participating in the Asbury Cafe mission at the State Fair by donating the many gluten free pies that are sold there each year. In 2015, Sweet Nothings started selling at Los Ranchos Growers' Market.





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
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Leaving Pets Home Alone

Back to school? What does that mean for our four-legged friends? Schedule change can be stressful enough for us humans but can also be much more stressful for our four-legged friends. That sudden change from long summer days playing outside with kids and or playing inside the house, to living in an empty home (or a busy home filled with students studying) can be an extreme adjustment. Here are a few tips to help with the transition for your four-legged friends. Ease your pet into the new schedule. What does this mean? "Before school starts, begin getting your dog accustomed to the soon-to-be new schedule. Get up early, take your pup out for a rigorous walk, and introduce the activities they can do when everyone is gone," says Mary R. Burch, a certified applied animal behaviorist, and the AKC Family Dog Director, (Barbara Balfour, 2021)

Enrichment toys. Enrichment toys can do wonders for pet. You may already have a few. It wouldn't hurt to purchase a few more to give a little bit more variety in your pet's daily enrichment. You can generally fill these types of toys with desirable treats like- peanut butter, cheese, and or various fruits. These types of toys can also be frozen as well, giving your pet an extended amount of time to work out their reward. Playing hide and seek with enrichment toys is another form of overall enrichment for your pet. Prefill your enrichment toys with any of the desirable treats stated above,




freeze, and then hide a few of them throughout your house. This will make a great game for your pet and also gives them a job to complete while everyone is out of the house, and or studying/working on homework.

Dr. Jessica Taylor, a North Carolina-based veterinarian states, "Even though your mornings may now be more hectic with getting your kids out the door to school, try not to cut corners for your canine companion. Only taking your dog for a short walk in the morning can lead to trouble later in the day. Pets that normally spend their day playing, going in and out with kids, or being stimulated with people around them, can experience stress and anxiety when they are suddenly left alone. Aim to get up a bit earlier to allow for a long walk or 20-minute play session in the yard to get their energy out." (Barbara Balfour, 2021)

In short, if you have a four-legged friend, and their schedule is about to change due to you or your children heading back to school, take the time to help with your pets' transition into their new schedule.

Add the watermelon to a bowl. Toss with the mint, lime zest and olive oil. Top with pieces of the burrata cheese and pistachios. Drizzle with olive oil and mix until well combined.

Serve immediately with salt on the side. Let your guests add the salt at the table so they can feel the crunch while enjoying the salad.

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

Fifteen years ago, Susan Florsheim started out as a Teacher's Assistant at Los Niños Montessori Preschool in Los Ranchos. She had always been interested in working with children, although it is not what she originally went to school for. It just seemed to be where life led her, and made her realize how much she enjoyed working with children. Nine years ago, she became the schools owner/director. Susan enjoys the balance between running the business while being able to create a beautiful learning environment for the students and teachers.

The school currently has six teachers, including Susan, and 35 students enrolled in three classrooms: infant, toddler, and primary. Though their capacity is closer to 50 students, they have chosen to keep numbers down during Covid.

Susan stresses the importance of a preschool education for children: "Preschool is so important for many reasons. I think everyone has their own reason for wanting their child in school.

Some focus more on the socialization with peers and other adults. During Covid, that was very hard, and I think everyone is realizing how important it is! Some really want to support their child's academic development [...]."

Los Niños follows the Montessori principles of education: "Montessori focuses on the child as an individual instead of mainly working with the class as a whole. Each child learns at their own pace, so no one gets left behind, and no one gets bored. We create a learning environment for the students that helps to foster their love of learning and concentration. There are also specific materials that we use in the classroom, such as real-life materials instead of plastic toys. Some examples would be real screwdrivers and screws in a tool set instead of a plastic play tool set and real glass pitchers and dishes instead of plastic ones. These help the

children to slow down and concentrate on what they are doing. We also have mixed-age classrooms. Peer influence is huge with learning. The older ones reinforce their learning by helping the younger ones. The younger ones look up to the older ones and can learn so much just by observing. The Montessori classroom environment is set up from a child's perspective, not an adult's."





Reconnecting With Your Body

Over the last year, I've noticed a recurring theme emerge when someone new reaches out to my studio. A recent caller shared that in the last two years she'd lost a valuable connection; "I've not exercised in two years," her voice a combination of trepidation and disbelief. Another client told me, "My knees hurt now, and they never hurt before." It's my belief that the pandemic may have temporarily changed each of us, creating less body connection, less embodiment.

Overall, the emerging theme is disconnection. It may be a disconnection from movement, or from feeling, or from relaxation. The desire underneath, always, is for the connection to return.

For someone who has been somewhat sedentary, or stressed, or even just too reluctant to slow down, it's good to begin with exercises for reconnecting with the physical body. There are hundreds of ways to start, but the easiest, most profound are techniques that place attention on breath and posture.

Remember, consideration and thoughtfulness toward breath quiets the mind by dialing up the parasympathetic nervous system. And a return to how to breathe involves deeper concentration, and ultimately, requires connecting with the muscles most involved in breathing. The diaphragm, one of the deep intrinsic stabilizing muscles of the torso, is the

muscle used in breathing. Another intrinsic stabilizing muscle in the torso is the transversus abdominus (TVA). Engaging this deep abdominal muscle always improves posture.

A favorite combination I teach is a practice of lengthening the spine while placing attention to the breath, creating a powerful healing connection.

Standing Breathwork For Reconnecting With Your Body

This exercise is best performed standing. You'll need two adjustable hiking poles set to about 48 inches. Or make a set with a pair of 1 inch x 48-inch wooden dowels.

 Stand with your feet under your hips, one stick in each hand. Place your hands, palm-down, directly on top of each stick, allowing your fingers to lengthen and relax. The sticks should be perpendicular to the floor and held at arms-length.

► Straighten your arms, and press downward more firmly into the sticks. As you press, listen and feel, notice what's going on in your body, specifically around and through your belly, your sides, under your arms.

Did you notice how your ribcage lifted upward and away from your waistband when you pushed downward on the sticks? This easy move enhances good posture. Feel the difference in your spine? Practice it again.

Now, place attention at the breath. While keeping your arms long, the sticks upright and your chest lifted, draw-in your belly-button. This cue creates awareness and thus strengthens the deepest of the abdominal muscles, the TVA. Once the TVA is drawn-in, keep it drawn-in.

Still pressing your palms into the sticks, slowly inhale through your nose, expanding your ribcage. Don't let your TVA slacken (remember, this is the muscle you engaged by drawing-in your belly button). Once your ribs are fully expanded, exhale through pursed lips making the sshhh sound as you go.

Notice what happened next? Making the sshhh sound produced more tightness in your abdomen—specifically the

TVA muscle. The ab muscle grew tauter. Try this again! Take another deep breath, allowing the ribs to open. Don't forget to keep the belly tucked in. Then exhale.

The deep inhalations and slow exhalations work the diaphragm, another of the deep intrinsic stabilizing muscles of the torso. While practicing, keep attention at the arms, the chest, the belly, and the breath.

Start this daily exercise with 6-8 smooth, slow breaths. Build-up to doing this technique for 4-5 minutes each day. Dedicating time to performing this each day can reconnect you with your body in ways that may surprise and delight.

FARM CAMPS AT THE LARRY P. ABRAHAM AGRI-NATURE CENTER

This summer has seen the Agri-Nature Center bustling with lots of activity and growth. In addition to plants and animals, the most important thing we are cultivating at the Ag Center is young minds! It is vital for young people to understand where their food comes from, connect with nature, and experience the benefits of hard work and problem solving.

This summer we hosted Explora's Farm Camps, Natures Niños Farm Camps, Youth Conservation Corps teams, and Honey Badger Conservation Crew teams. Each of these groups have shared a little bit about their experience at the Ag Center, and we have compiled this to give you a glimpse of our summer.

EXPLORA FARM CAMPS

Explora returned to the Agri-Nature Center to facilitate weekly summer Farm Camps for preK-8th grade students. Topics for elementary-age students included exploring the botanical functions and culinary uses of plants, from seeds and leaves to roots and fruits, and the presence and necessity of water in agriculture and surrounding environments.





Building on field experiences in and around the farm, handson activities—such as building an aquifer model or designing an edible plant to be grown in a specific environment—aim to foster science, engineering, and art practices for investigating the ecological and cultural significance of food production and water management.

Community partners generously shared their knowledge with the students, from making salad with Three Sisters Kitchen, learning about honeybees with NM Bee-keepers, digging up garlic and onions with the Master Gardeners, and touring the Rio Grande Community Farms.

Middle school-age students focused on farming for the future, integrating new technologies with traditional farming practices, and paired with UNM's Center for Water & the Environment to design engineering solutions for water resources in New Mexico.

They have been able to witness the happenings inside a hive and have even been able to get a fresh sample of honey to taste.

Through this amazing partnership with the Agri-Nature Center our youth have been exposed to a plethora of agricultural ideas such as the benefits of worms, soil health, farm-to-table, seed germination and so much more!



Her art transports you to that place in the mountains among the majestic beauty of nature.

To make her art, Penelope first cuts a sheet of glass. "If I want an animal on that piece, I paint it first, then I cut my trees out of white glass" in different thicknesses and sizes which adds depth to the piece. Instead of painting the trees, she uses crushed glass. Then she fires them in kiln. Each piece can take up to 30 hours to create.



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

- 2. Use this new Center as a focal point of Village activities, tie into Village trails, be positioned on Village maps, and optimally be featured in Village marketing.
- 3. Use this new Center and its content to relate directly or indirectly to efforts currently underway by the NPS to develop the National Historic El Camino Real Trail.

Village Branding Subcommittee Recommendations

- 1. Create a Village "Brand"—a marketing campaign to promote Village businesses.
- 2. Promote the 4th Street business by using the Village brand.
- 3. Engage a professional marketing agency to develop this concept and apply appropriate resources to ensure its success.
